

## FORFATTERPRESENTASJONER

**Mieke Bal**, a cultural theorist and critic, is a Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences Professor (KNAW). She is based at the Amsterdam School for Cultural Analysis (ASCA), University of Amsterdam. Her areas of interest range from biblical and Classical antiquity to 17th century and contemporary art and modern literature, feminism and migratory culture. Her many books include *A Mieke Bal Reader* (2006), *Travelling Concepts in the Humanities* (2002) and *Narratology* (third edition 2009).

**Helena Bodin** is Senior Lecturer at the Department of Literature and History of Ideas, Stockholm University. Her dissertation (2002) and articles are dedicated to the study of connections between modern literature and the Byzantine Orthodox Christian tradition and its aesthetics. She is now completing a book on the representation of Byzantium in Swedish and Finno-Swedish literature and culture during the 1950s and 60s.

**Fredrik Chr. Brøgger** is Professor of American Literature and Civilization at the University of Tromsø. Brøgger wrote his doctoral dissertation on the American literature of the 1920s, has co-edited *American Culture: An Anthology of Civilization Texts* (1996 and 2007), and is the author of *Culture, Language, Text* (1992) and numerous articles on a variety of topics and texts within American literature, American (popular) culture, American Studies theory and, in recent years, nature writing, ecocriticism, and Arctic studies.

**Steen Christiansen**, a cultural texts researcher, is Assistant Professor at the Department for Language and Culture, Aalborg University. His interests are primarily contemporary media culture, with special attention to cultural transgression and hauntology. He is currently writing a book on hauntology as a cultural phenomenon.

**Tanja Dromnes** arbeider som språklærer i ungdomsskolen med norsk, engelsk og spansk som fag. I tillegg går hun siste året på 5-årig integrert lektorutdanning med master i engelsk hvor pedagogikk og narrative strategier vil være hovedfokus i masteroppgaven.

**Geir Grenersen** er dr.polit og førsteamanuensis i dokumentasjonsvitenskap ved Institutt for kultur og litteratur, Universitetet i Tromsø. Hans forskning er først og fremst knyttet til samisk kultur og samfunnsforhold. Han har gitt ut boken *Ved forskningenes grenser*, Spartacus Forlag (2002). Han siste artikkel er "Oppvekst i markebygdene på 1980-tallet", David Girji 2009. Han arbeider nå med problemstillinger rundt etableringer av samiske språk- og kultursentre.

**Ragnhild Maria Hauglid Henden** er stipendiat ved Senter for studier av Holocaust og livssynsminoriteter i Oslo. Hennes forskningsfelt er populære forestillinger av jøder i Norge mellom 1840 og 1940.

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**Silvia Lutter** Silvia Lutter er mag.art. i nordisk og pedagogikk (Tübingen, 2008). I 2007-2008 tok hun årsstudium i nordisk ved Universitetet i Tromsø mens hun skrev sin magisteroppgave om kenninger og metaforer i norrøn skaldediktning. Hun planlegger å skrive en doktoravhandling om møykonger i islandske sagaer.

**Kenneth Mikalsen** arbeider for tiden som lektor og rådgiver ved Sonans Privatgymnas avdeling Tromsø. I tillegg er han medforfatter på et digitalt læreverk i faget internasjonal engelsk.

**Ruben Moi** is Research Fellow in English and Comparative Literature at the University of Tromsø and a member of the university's research group Border Poetics. At present, he is working on a project entitled *From the Frontiers of Writing: Ekphrasis and Transgressionality in Contemporary Northern Irish Poetics* and on a monograph on the Irish-American poet Paul Muldoon. He has published articles and book chapters on Seamus Heaney, Samuel Beckett, Harold Pinter, T. S. Eliot, Martin McDonagh and Irvine Welsh.

His current research interests are identity and hybridity in recent Afrikaans and South African literature.
